

Supporting your student in building their "Scholar Profile"



What is your "Scholar Profile"?

In addition to academic requirements (course credits and grades), colleges are looking for well-rounded students who will contribute to the college and campus community.

The student's scholar profile includes:

- Awards and honors
- Educational prep programs (e.g., tutoring, CAP)
- Extracurricular and leadership activities (music, sports, clubs, etc.)
- Volunteer or Community Service activities
- Other coursework
- Work experience

BRAG SHEET

- Academic interests
- Career interests
- Personal passions
- Outside responsibilities
- Personality and character
- Contributions

What does "well-rounded" mean?

Well-rounded students demonstrate they are pursuing their learning and other interests not only through academic coursework but also through:

Community Service | Volunteering | Leadership Opportunities | Extracurricular and Academics and more!

Well-rounded does NOT mean trying to do ALL THE THINGS!



Brag Sheet / Scholar Profile

CESS PLAT

- The Brag Sheet has many uses!
- When you apply to Pre-College or Summer Programs.
- It can be given to a recommender who will write a letter on your behalf.
- You will use it if you apply to the University of California (UC) and most private colleges & universities and even scholarships.
- Highlights how you choose to use your time <u>outside</u> the classroom.

College Resume - Example

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES & COMMUNITY SERVICE

Include activities from school (e.g., clubs, student government, theater, sports) and outside of school (e.g., volunteer work, music lessons, club sports, youth groups, serious hobbies, babysitting).

Important: For activities categorized as volunteer/community service or educational preparation program in the UC application, make sure to add a description of the organization.



Zooming in: 9th Grade


The beginning of high school is an exciting time. Your child may be adjusting to a new school, making new friends and becoming more independent. Many children struggle academically at the beginning of high school, so your child still needs your help and involvement.

9th Grade: Counselor-initated activities

- Transcript Review/Graduation Requirement/A-G Lessons
- 4-year plan individual counseling (x/year)
- Post-Secondary Planning
- PSAT Intro
- Interventions for Academic Gaps
- Transitions/Adjustments to High School

Zooming in: 9th Grade, cont.

Opportunities & Support Programs

- <u>College Access Plan</u> (CAP)- offers a wide range of free college resources for students and families. Students can attend <u>CAP Drop-In Program</u> and participate in enrolled courses. Any student may take advantage of this program, whether to explore college options, discuss course (and other) requirements, learn about financial aid, work on college essays - anything college-related!
- <u>PCC Upward Bound Trio</u>, <u>CSULA Upward Bound</u>, <u>UCLA VIPS</u> and the <u>UCLA Early</u>
 <u>Academic Outreach Program EAOP</u> are designed to expand postsecondary education opportunities for California's educationally disadvantaged students, and are available to PUSD students.
- Check your high school counseling office webpage for other school-specific academic support programs.
- High Schools also offer <u>"Wellness"</u> services and mental health support. Check the school website or ask your <u>school's community assistant!</u>

Zooming in: 9th Grade (cont.)


Pro-tips:

- Many students struggle a bit academically when they start high school.
- Get in the habit of using <u>Aeries Parent Portal</u> to view your student's Academic Plan and make sure they are on track with course requirements as well as grades.
- A-G counselors can help with credit recovery, including re-taking courses that require a C grade or higher to count towards college eligibility. Courses can be made up if necessary over summer* or in twilight school.
- Check weekly e-bulletins sent out by the school for reminders of important dates or announcements of special programs or opportunities. (See also social media.)
- Use the summer between 9th & 10th to explore interests.

*Setting students up for success from the beginning is key! No matter where your student is looking to go to college, all 4 years of high school grades matter!

Zooming in: 10th Grade

Grades ALWAYS matter! Encourage your student to take challenging courses, especially in areas of interest. Start exploring college options, and make good use of the summer to round out your student's scholar profile.

10th Grade: Counselor-initiated activities

- College Readiness
- Visit local colleges and attend PUSD College Fair
- PSAT (optional)*
- Healthy Habits



Zooming in: 10th Grade, cont.

Resources for students and families:

<u>California College Guidance Initiative (CCGI)</u> - Students will be guided to create a CCGI account in 11th grade if they haven't already, but you can start exploring this resource sooner with your student. Parents can also create an account that allows you to track/monitor your child's planning and progress.

<u>College Board</u>- Create an account together with your student. Have the login information so that you can check it.

<u>College Board's "Big Future"</u> website also has a wealth of resources for exploring colleges and careers, learning about financial aid, and even year-by-year "action plans" for families.

Zooming in: 10th Grade, cont.

Pro-Tips

- **GRADES MATTER!** UC/CSUs begin calculating your GPA beginning with the A-G classes taken the summer before your sophomore year (10th grade)
- Take rigorous courses in areas where student is interested and has potential to do well.
- Encourage student to explore interests clubs, sports, volunteer opportunities, summer programs - students who can tell a compelling story about who they are and how they are pursuing the things that interest them will be more attractive college candidates than those who are just randomly doing a lot of different kinds of activities.
- Use your summers well!



Zooming in: 11th Grade

Junior year marks a turning point, when academics and college planning activities kick into high gear.

11th Grade: Counselor-initiated activities

- PUSD students create CCGI account (if they have not already) & complete resource interest inventories; parents can also create an account to track/monitor college planning progress
- College list matched to careers
- PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test* (Fall)
- SAT/ACT (Spring) -
- "Brag Sheet" students compile list of achievements and activities for teachers and counselors who will be writing letters of recommendation for them
- Social Emotional Learning dealing with anxiety

Zooming in: 11th grade, cont.

Opportunities and Resources:

- College Access Plan (CAP) sponsors a number of workshops for students and info sessions for parents. (More about this in a minute!)
- Summer programs if there is a program of interest that requires an application to participate, that will look better than a program anyone can participate in by just paying a fee. UC COSMOS- a Math and Science Camp offered at <u>UC Davis</u>, <u>UCI</u>, <u>UCSC</u>, <u>Academic Pre-College Program at UCLA</u>, <u>Cal-TECH</u>, <u>PCC</u> among others
- Students in <u>PUSD's College & Career Academies</u> can get a leg up on <u>internship</u> opportunities the summer after junior year.



Zooming in: 11th grade, cont.

Pro-tips for Junior Year

- Have your child make a College Board account using non-PUSD email, save the information, and share with you. (You should also be able to create a parent account to see your student's CCGI account activity.)
- It's not so much about doing ALL THE THINGS as it is about a student discovering her or his passions, strengths, and interests. Get involved with just a couple of clubs or activities and grow involvement and leadership in those areas rather than joining half a dozen clubs.
- Similarly do not try to take ALL the AP classes! Match your child's interests, strengths, and possible major.
- Internships, jobs, or volunteer positions where a 3rd party can attest to the hours your student put in carries more weight than a family-based activity.

Zooming in: 12th Grade

12th Grade - Counselor-initiated activities

- College Applications (Fall Oct. 1-Nov. 30 for UC/CSUs)
 - Ask for letters of recommendation early!
 - "PIQ"s Personal Insight Questions students choose 3 of 5 topics to respond to in preparation for writing college essays
- Financial Aid & Financial Literacy lessons (Oct 1- Mar 2) go over difference between public & private colleges, loans vs. scholarships or grants, etc.
- 4-Year Plan individual counseling (graduation requirement checks & A-G checks)



Zooming in: 12th grade, continued

Opportunities & Resources

- College Access Plan can help students research scholarships and grants, as well as complete financial aid forms and understand loan options. CAP also helps families evaluate financial aid offers once college acceptances arrive.
- College Board's "Big Future" Family Action Plan for Senior Year: <u>Family Action Plan 12th Grade</u>

Pro-tip:

• There is a lot going on Senior year, and for many students this is a time to enjoy the present rather than worry about the future. Having things organized so you can help your student keep track of what needs doing (and when) can help everyone have a better senior year!


